GONE BUT NOT FORGOTTEN

As reported in our first issue, Rev. Henry Marin is deceased; we have learned that his wife, Betty, is also gone. A note in Mom Rattan's address book indicates that their daughter is Betty Delcamp.

Mable Adney Britt died at the age of 95 in November 1995. She was the mother of Genene Eazer and Sherryll Dickenson. Are Eric & Lillian Adney also relatives?

We were pleased to hear from **Dalton Porter.** He received a copy of the *News* and the questionnaire from Elton Curnutt (thanks, Elton!) and sent the Q back to us, along with some new names and addresses.

Dalton was in the Marines from December 1942 until November 1944. His wife, the former Nellie Shriver, was in the Navy from September 1943 until October 1945. Both attended the Home. They were married by Bro. Mincey at Elim Assembly, one of the churches participating with the Home.

"Nellie was one of three WAVES invited to the Home one Sunday -- the first women service personnel to attend. Little did I know that my invitation that day would lead to our marriage once year later on October 6, 1944.

"We celebrated our 50th anniversary October 6, 1994 and she went to be with her Saviour one week later - October 13, 1994 -- her birthday. Many happy years and memories lie in between as well as heartaches."

After their marriage, he "went overseas with the 4th Marine Division and Nellie stayed behind and was active in the Hospitality Home until I returned. We both received our discharges in December 1945

and headed home.

"God has been good to us even through serious illnesses. We lost a 35-year-old daughter in August '92 and the stress of that reactivated a dormant cancer in Nellie, which proved fatal.

"In 1951 polio struck me and left its telling traces. Somewhat hindered in mobility, we enjoyed ourselves. After 43 years with Mobil Oil Corp., I retired in 1984. I'm now recuperating from fivebypass surgery.

"After Nellie's passing, I got the idea to see if any of the friends in our wedding could be found-here they are. I'm still unable to locate a Milton Fountain from the Navy." 

We have thought many times in fond memories of the Rattans and the great contribution they made with the services there. Even though we were married and had a home there, there were times when we were lonely too since we were far from our families, and our visits there were a blessing to us too.

I hope that you have a great response from many others who visited there. They were a tremendous help to many lonely people and a great assistance to help many new converts become established in the Lord. My husband passed away on June 23, 1989. Sincerely, **Inez Frame**



CHOW DOWN!

Gladys Olson made Orange Fluff Pie

during her years at the Home. She points out that the nuts are what "make" the pie: To your favorite pie crust recipe, add ¼ cup walnuts, finely chopped. Bake and cool before filling.

Orange filling:

1/3 to 1/2 c. sugar1 c. cold water1 Tbsp. gelatin (1 env.)3 eggs, separated1/8 tsp. salt3 Tbsp. additional sugar1/2 c. undiluted frozen orange juice, thawedWhipped creamChopped walnuts for garnish

Gelatin mixture: Place ¹/₃ to ¹/₂ c. sugar, gelatine, salt and water in top of double boiler. Cook over direct heat, stirring constantly, until dissolved. Remove from heat. Blend in 3 egg yolks, slightly beaten, to which a little of the hot mixture has been added. Cook over boiling water, stirring constantly, until mixture coats a metal spoon, about 3 minutes. Remove from heat. Add ¹/₂ c. undiluted frozen orange juice, thawed. Chill until thickened, but not set.

Meringue: Beat 3 egg whites until foamy. Add 3 Tbsp. additional sugar gradually, beating well after each addition. Continue beating until meringue stands in stiff peaks. Gently but thoroughly, fold in the gelatin mixture. Chill until thick but not set.

Turn into cooled baked pie shell. Chill until firm. Serve with whipped cream. Garnish with chopped walnuts, if desired.

"Mother Layne's Hospitality Home for Servicemen" was founded by Mrs. M.E. Layne, whose given name was Bertha. She was the widow of Mahlon E. Layne, who developed a special water pump and became a wealthy man. Before M.E.'s death in 1927, he set up a charitable foundation, which provided Mother Layne with the funds to start the servicemen's work in 1941.

To assist her in the work, she found Irvin L. and Bertha Rattan. After Mother Layne's death in 1944, they became known as Dad and Mom Rattan. The Layne Foundation continued to underwrite the Home.

By the time the Home closed in 1975, more than 650,000 servicemen and women had gone through the Home.
