Precious Memories. Lois and I first met in 1944 at the Hospitality Home while cleaning dishes following an evening service. She had come with a youth group from First A of G Church. Being an excellent song leader, Lois led the singing; then assisted in serving refreshments. We talked during the clean-up. After several months, we began dating, lasting for only a brief time until I departed for Okinawa. Upon my return in 1946; we dated, then married, 8-9-46. So, we had a long span together. Three children: Jeannie, 56 yrs, teacher and administrator in a private school in PA; Mel, 52 yrs, heavy construction safety engineer in TX; David, 48 yrs, printer & truck driver with me here in CO. My second career in the military - Army Chaplaincy, 1954 to 1971, saw us in many places. Lois became an elementary teacher with a career of 25 yrs. The family was active in various phases of ministry in all of the locations and assignments. God blessed in many ways.

Losing Lois after 56+ yrs is difficult but God provides much help through family, friends, and neighbors. Our auto accident, 1-5-03, happened as we returned from a funeral in OK. Lois died instantly. CHOW DOWN!

Lazyman's Enchiladas - This recipe grew from my attempts to make enchiladas like those we feasted on at "La Casa Blanca" restaurant in Old Town San Diego in 1952-1952. *Marge*

1 ½ lbs. ground beef
1 Tbsp. dried onion bits
1/4 tsp. garlic powder
½ tsp. cumin
½ tsp. oregano
2 Tbsp. chili powder
1 tsp. salt
1 8-oz. can tomato sauce
1 8-oz. can water
1 15-1/2 oz. Mexican-style beans in chili gravy
1 dozen corn tortillas, torn in half
Cheese slices, enough for several layers
½ c. chopped fresh onions

Crumble and brown the meat; pour off fat. Stir in onion bits, spices, salt, tomato sauce and water. Simmer, covered, for 15 minutes. Add the beans and chili gravy and heat through, stirring occasionally. Layer in baking pan until all ingredients are used: meat and bean mixture, tortillas, cheese, then onions; top with cheese. (Pour over additional ½ can of water if it looks dry.) Cover with aluminum foil and heat in oven until mixture bubbles and cheese is melted. This also may be layered in a crock pot and heated on low for an hour or so. (In oven, 40 minutes at 350 degrees.) If desired, garnish with slices of jalapeno peppers. Serve with tossed salad and crisp tortilla chips. [For the cheese, combinations of the following may be used: Velveeta brand; cheddar; Colby; Monterey Jack.]

Virginia Gonzales Hayden was the one who taught me how to make Tacos, in 1952. I would love to have her recipe for them! Virginia, that's a BIG hint (grin)! For supper with the Home Gang, we'd sometimes have tacos, and then brag on how many we'd eaten. My personal best was 5, I seem to remember. Not bad for the slender bride I was then.

From the World War II Years "Old Friends"

Dalton Porter invited three WAVES to the Home one Sunday in Sept. 1943; they were the first women service personnel to attend. Little did he know that the invitation would lead to his marriage to Nellie Shriver a year later! The wedding was performed at one of the churches who participated with the Home, Elim Assembly. Pastor Bill Mincey officiated. Dalton went overseas with the 4th Marine Division, while Nellie stayed behind and was active in the Home. Both received their discharge in December 1945 and headed home to Texas.

After Nellie passed away in 1994, Dalton looked up the friends who were in their wedding. After we began The Home News, he sent us their addresses. All are now on our list except the ones who have passed away (Loretta Atkinson, U. Larry Hudlow, and James & Minnie Stokes McPherson): Arnold & Veneder "Petey" Barnett; Elton & Lois Curnutt; Augilee Frank; Bernice Hudlow; George & Adaire (Weston) Monta; Arthur Patrick; Merle & Mary Lou (Woods) Robbins; Lyla Soule; Heron & Lib Story; Bill & Erlene (Trout) White; and Richard & June (Bay) Wolfe. Arthur Patrick and Petey Barnett are brother and sister.

Arnold and Petey (Patrick) Barnett were married in November 1943 by Dad Rattan at the Hospitality Home. Petey lived in the Home for a while in 1945, doing cooking and housework. The Barnetts settled in Louisiana. Recently they moved to Texas because of Veneder's health.

Elton & Lois Curnutt live in Colorado, 10 miles from Ft. Carson and they are active in the Army Chapel there.

Bernice Hudlow has many wonderful memories of the Home with her favorite being how Larry Hudlow swept her off her feet with a warm drink of Borden's Hemo one evening. Six weeks later they were engaged, and another six weeks later they were married. Larry passed away in 1998.

Sailor **George Monta** came to the Home in 1944 and met Adair Weston, whose father Leonard Weston, was the pastor of First Assembly of God at 6th & Fir in San Diego. For some reason, the young couple decided to be married in the church, not the Home – wonder why? George says, "The Hospitality Home provided a warm loving refuge where I learned to dig into the word. Met Adaire and became established in the Lord. Taught school 25 years, then was ordained A/G and pastored for many years. Now we travel - teach - preach and enjoy our 10 acres here in No. Carolina."

William Arthur "Pat" Patrick was in the Army while he attended the Home in 1942-1943. He also went to "6th

& Fir." He writes, "I enjoyed the Home very much; it meant a lot to me, being away from home. I think Mom & Dad Rattan were the finest couple I've ever known. They helped so many servicemen away from home." He left the Home when he was sent overseas to the Pacific, where he stayed until after the war ended. He had met Annabel Short in the spring of 1943, two days after he left the Home, and they were married in December 1945. He was out of the Army for 26 months and then went into the Air Force, retiring in 1963. After 14 years with the Post Office, he retired again. Now he fishes, hunts and works with Royal Rangers, "just enjoying life."

Lyla Soule is a CPA in La Jolla. She was at Mother Layne's in 1944 and 1945.

Erlene White writes, "I lived and worked at the Home for several months in 1944. Everything from typing to cleaning the dormitory. Met some wonderful friends who made my stay enjoyable and fruitful. The programs we put together and presented at the various churches helped me grow spiritually."

Warren Halleen was at the Home in 1942. "When in San Diego on leave from the Marine Corps Base, I was invited by a group of men to visit the Home. While not remembering how many times I revisited the Home, I certainly do remember being filled with the Spirit on Christmas Day 1942. Shortly after that I went overseas the South Pacific for 36 months. Returning after the war, I stopped in to see the Rattans. I don't recall now how I got out of the Base (I couldn't be out for any length of time) but at least I could say goodbye to my friends, so helpful to me. I was to be discharged in Philadelphia. ... So many times during the years I've thought about Mother Layne's and been thankful for the friends there, who reached out to me. This has been so pleasant to be contacted after so many years. It seems that the Lord's people can just pick up right where they left off!"

Stanley Smedsrud was at the Home for two periods: May-October 1943 and June-September 1945. "In 1943 as a Navy lad, I was invited to Layne's Hospitality Home from downtown San Diego. Rev. & Mrs. Rattan were my spiritual leaders. Mrs. Rattan would put her whole being into leading the song service and Rev. Rattan always gave a clear, concise message of the gospel with many, many service men and women accepting Christ. The evening meal was a great treat. During the times I was there, I worked on the street inviting service people to the Home."

Peggy Morper recently wrote, "My husband **Oather** and I have fond memories of the Hospitality Home of many years ago and enjoyed attending and worshiping with everyone. We've wondered where people are that we knew years ago."

LEST WE FORGET

"Mother Layne's Hospitality Home for Servicemen" was founded by Mrs. M.E. Layne, whose given name was Bertha. She was the widow of Mahlon E. Layne, who developed a special water pump and became a wealthy man. Before M.E.'s death in 1927, he set up a charitable foundation, which provided Mother Layne with the funds to start the servicemen's work in 1941.

To assist her in the work, she found Irvin L. and Bertha Rattan. After Mother Layne's death in 1944, they became known as Dad and Mom Rattan. The Layne Foundation continued to underwrite the Home, which was located at 1268 22nd Street, San Diego, California.

By the time it closed in 1975, more than 650,000 service men and women had gone through the "Home Away From Home."
